COURSE DESCRIPTION:

When tasked with processing violent crime scenes, it's important to approach each scene as if it's a puzzle in need of solving. What pieces are missing? Which hypotheses make sense and which do not? Which pieces need to be kept to complete the full picture, if not now perhaps in the future?
